Intent of this scheme of learning	Prior learning and links to future learning
<p>The intent of this scheme of learning is for students to understand the tensions which arose from World War II and the ideological differences which led to an increase in relations. Students will understand the challenges when countries tried to co-operate and how opposing camps were formed. This unit supports student understanding of America’s position in the world today and their relationship with the Russia. More recently, students will gain a greater understanding of the Russia-Ukraine war and see patterns with actions from the Cold War era.</p>	<p>At KS3, students have studied World War II and post war international relations. Students also have a grasp on ideologies with the ‘How did conflict cause new ideas?’ topic in Yr 9 when assessing Communism, Fascism and Nazism. The Cold War unit then links to A level studies when student study ‘The making of a superpower: USA’ and revisit the Cold War conflict.</p>

<p>Disciplinary knowledge refers to knowledge of history as a discipline: the methods of historians and their conceptual frameworks.
