This is a summary of how our school delivers music education to all our pupils across three areas – curriculum music, co-curricular provision and musical experiences – and what changes we are planning in future years. This information is to help pupils and parents or carers understand what our school offers and who we work with to support our pupils' music education.

Part A: Curriculum music

This is about what we teach in lesson time, how much time is spent teaching music and any music qualifications or awards that pupils can achieve.

The Academy of St Nicholas is an academy with age range 11-19 mixed secondary school which is Roman Catholic and Church of England school. The music department is currently staffed by one music teacher. Key Stage 3 curriculum is one hour a week on a two-week timetable. Keystage 4 is BTEC First Music is 5 hours over a fortnight. The music department consists of three practice rooms and the main classroom is equipped with 17 mac computers.

The music curriculum encompasses the areas of Listening, Performing, Composing and Singing.

Listening

All students will listen to and appraise music linked to the units studied. They will also be encouraged to listen to an eclectic year group playlist created to develop musical awareness, enhance home based listening and expand knowledge of different genres. Regular class-based tasks and bi-annual formal listening tests will support the development of aural skills.

Performing

Students will perform regularly on various instruments and voice. This includes ensemble singing (in year 7), solo and duet keyboard tasks, guitars and ukuleles.

Composing

Students will compose in various forms as they progress through key stage 3 and 4. Group work compositions developing an understanding of Blues, Major and Minor scales runs through key stage 3. At Key Stage 4 level, students will use Logic Pro X to support individual composition coursework.

Singing

Singing is taught as a unit of work leading towards Christmas, consisting mainly of secular Christmas songs. Pupils are then encouraged to join the school choir and uptake peripatetic singing lessons to further develop their vocal skill sets.

Key Stage 3 Curriculum

The Key stage 3 curriculum is designed to develop knowledge acquired at KS2 and build on securing understanding of the elements of music through the study of the history of music in chronological order. This sequence of lessons over three years includes development of aural skills, solo keyboard skills, guitar, ukulele and ensemble skills, as well as gaining a deep understanding of how to use Logic Pro X to record, edit and remix music.

Year 7

The introduction of Rhythm and pulse in the first term allows students to secure the most basic musical foundations through Traditional African music. Regular singing in class through November and December, and an annual Christmas show, embeds a singing culture which is reinforced by preparations for a choral group performance at the Liverpool Anglican Cathedral in the summer term.

Term two builds on the musical notation foundations established in term one by introducing the element of pitch, through gaining an understanding of how to read and perform music for keyboard/piano.

Term three builds on the skills acquired in term one and two through analysis of all the elements of music, and their creative and effective use in musical composition projects.

All students can expect weekly verbal feedback from their teacher alongside peer and self-assessment as well as numerous listening tasks through the term to develop aural perception.

Year 8

Our Year 8 curriculum builds on knowledge and skills mastered in year 7. The study of Blues and Rock and Roll music expands and secures understanding of structure,

chords, syncopation and improvisation through performances on guitar, ukulele and MIDI keyboards in Logic Pro X.

The study of popular music allows pupils the opportunity to analyse and perform popular songs in the musical canon. Pupils also learn techniques for composing popular songs.

Year 9

Learning about how to use all the functions of Logic Pro X dominates the year 9 curriculum, starting with Hip-Hop to introduce the concept of sampling and remixing other artists' music. Pupils then study EDM, composing using major and minor scales.

Film and video game music further develops their compositional skill set by introducing the diminished scale and whole tone scale, composing music to an industry brief.

Key Stage 4 curriculum

We follow the Edexcel BTEC Firsts in Music curriculum which includes:

25% - Managing a musical product

25% - The Music Industry (written exam)

25% - Introduction to composition

25% - Introduction to live sound

Special Educational Needs and Disabilities

The Academy of Saint Nicholas is a totally inclusive school and staff in all subjects are committed to equity and inclusion. In the music department opportunities to make music without restriction both during curriculum time and extra-curricular music clubs. This is paramount to our role within the school. Adaptations are always made to accommodate learning needs. It is recognised that some students may require additional, often temporary, scaffolded to reach these outcomes. The music department is a special place where students feel safe and part of a familiar and comfortable group sharing a common goal. There is tolerance, kindness and a real sense of community for all who seek music making.

Part B: Co-curricular music

This is about opportunities for pupils to sing and play music, outside of lesson time, including choirs, ensembles and bands, and how pupils can make progress in music beyond the core curriculum.

Links to Local Music Hub

The Academy of Saint Nicholas collaborates with Resonate Music Hub (Resonate (resonatehub.co.uk), engaging peripatetic staff to deliver instrumental tuition for band instruments, vocals, DJing and orchestral instruments.

Karaoke Club once a week at lunchtime, Harmonix Club (Vocal) once a week after school, Band Club is twice a week after school.

We offer a full day of Peripatetic lessons – this includes band instruments as well as singing, orchestral instruments and DJing. This is only subsidised for PPE students, otherwise the cost is £8 per lesson.

The department will work with the Drama department to produce a whole school talent show at Christmas.

Our spring term show is an 'X Factor-style' singing competition, designed to celebrate the hard work completed by pupils in karaoke club.

Our summer term show is a 'Battle of the Bands' event, showcasing the talents of our pupils who attend band club, as well as guest appearances from staff, and bands from other schools across our Trust.

We plan to visit the Liverpool Philharmonic with Year 9 to see Film Music by John Williams.

Year 7 will experience a pantomime or show.

Part C: Musical experiences

This is about all the other musical events and opportunities that we organise, such as singing in assembly, concerts and shows, and trips to professional concerts.
